DISCLAIMER

While we are committed to providing information regarding police activities to the media, we feel that we need to clarify a couple of things about the type of incident being reported. Police do not control what title a call is given when it is dispatched. That is done by the dispatcher who initially takes the 911 call. Based off of the information the dispatcher receives from the citizen calling in, they assign it a title. This means, for example, that although something may be entered initially as an assault, once police arrive on scene they may determine that no assault took place and no police action is required.

Also, different types of calls can be entered with the same title in our computer systems. For example, Mill Creek officers are regularly talking with citizens while on patrol. They also routinely investigate suspicious looking vehicles in the community. Both of these can be given the same title of suspicious. This means that although it may appear that Mill Creek officers are investigating a lot of suspicious activity, it could be that they are talking with citizens to promote community involved policing.

We wanted you to be aware of this information, so that you would have a better understanding of what is going on in Mill Creek, and what your police officers are doing to better serve this community.
